We'd like to introduce you to Justine Aenishaenslin – Baptist World Aid Australia's disaster management specialist for its work in the Middle East. Justine brings a wealth of field experience to her role – for 12 months, she worked with Syrian refugees in a camp in Jordan. Earlier this year Justine visited the work supported by Baptist World Aid's Middle East Crises Appeal.

### **What projects were you visiting?**

I was in Lebanon visiting the projects of our Christian field partner the Lebanese Society of Educational and Social Development (LSESD).

### **What is LSESD?**

LSESD is the Baptist Fellowship of Lebanon. And one of its arms is relief and development – which it sees as a

really important part of its Christian ministry. Given the previous Civil War, the occupation of Lebanon by Syria, and the poverty and inequality within their own country, LSESD has come to understand that it's really important that local churches and Christian organisations are supported in their service of communities.

### **What are the needs of the communities Baptist World Aid works in (through LSESD)?**

There are high proportions of refugees. 1 in 4 people living in Lebanon is a refugee. They have no formal help because there are no refugee camps in Lebanon. Most of them fled across the border from Syria without anything. Many people are living in tents and there is a great need for food.

## plebiscite: (plebɪsɪt) noun -

*The direct vote of all the members of an electorate on an important public question.*

The date has been set for an event which very few of us would have previously experienced, a plebiscite; the only other plebiscites held in Australia were in 1916 and 1917 concerning military conscription. Although at time of writing legislation is still to be passed to enable this event, 11 February 2017 has been set as the day Australians will answer 'yes' or 'no' to the question **"Should the law be changed to allow same-sex couples to marry?"**

It is important that we recognise the privileged context in which we live, a liberal democracy. It is a privileged context because as citizens of our wonderful nation we have a voice, we have representation and we have opportunity to participate. Let's not take this privilege for granted but rather let us approach such opportunities with appropriate diligence and do so heeding the words of Paul:

*I urge, then, first of all, that petitions, prayers, intercession and thanksgiving be made for all people— for kings and all those in authority, that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness.*  
(1 Timothy 2:1-2, NIV)

There are, however, a few things that we should note about our participation in a liberal democracy's plebiscite. While we

have freedom to express our position we do not have the right to impose our views, ethics or convictions on others; this is about recognising we live in a diverse and free society. People will likely be very passionate about their perspective but **as followers of Jesus we must not stop showing compassion, mercy and love toward those who hold a different view to our own**; this is about the tone and posture of our engagement with others. And finally, in the event the outcome demonstrates that our society desires things different to and even in conflict with our own convictions, we will need to continue to learn to live and witness in a changing context.

As a Baptist movement here in S.A. and nationally, we have affirmed our belief that the unique relationship of marriage is one given by God for the flourishing of humanity. It is a grace, not law. We continue to hold the conviction that God's gift of marriage is the union of a man and a woman to the exclusion of all others, voluntarily entered into for life.

The plebiscite may be uncertain but the debate lives on so let us commit ourselves to modelling the ways of Jesus as we engage with others.

## A risky sovereignty

We know Jesus is Lord of all and he will bring to pass what he promises. But this cannot minimise the fragility of what followers of Jesus experience. As you read the letter of Acts, to say the risk wasn't that great because God was in control would be totally true and totally misleading. From the commissioning of Jesus (Acts 1:8) the letter is full of moments which are chaotic, uncertain. The power of the world constantly looks stronger than the promise of Jesus. Take the Apostle Paul's shipwreck in Malta in Acts 27-28. Prior to sailing Paul knows there will be loss of cargo and threat to life, but the ship sailed on regardless. After 14 nights in a fierce storm Paul was given these words from God:

Acts 27:24 'Do not be afraid, Paul. You must stand trial before Caesar; and God has graciously given you the lives of all who sail with you.'

Paul knew God's promise of protection which extended to the ship's company. How is God's sovereign promise worked out? By the ship running aground and breaking apart, by people leaping into the sea, by each one desperately catching hold of debris and thrashing for shore. A vivid image of utter chaos.

Paul and his Christian companions had confidence in God's promises, certainty in his sovereign power. Yet all this meant they had to leap into a boiling sea at the risk of their lives. The paradox of God's sovereignty and human responsibility ought to be worked out not at Bible College but in real life. It is not academic, it is heart racing action. Christians can take confidence in the power of our God to deliver and leap with real threat into a dangerous world. How is your appetite for the risky sovereignty of God? What was the last crazy risk you took, because you follow Jesus? Is our church life cultivating such a courageous faith?

## What if your life depended on the kindness of your enemy?

### **Why is LSESD working with churches to provide relief?**

Because churches are community organisations. So they have the ability to know people intimately and deeply. And they can recognise that there's been a change in their community. A lot of churches are seeing huge numbers of people approach them in real need. And, because of the generosity of our supporters, the churches are able to respond.

### **What challenges do these churches face in their communities?**

The huge influx of refugees is impacting the quality of public services in Lebanon. Lebanon already had issues with the supply of electricity and water, and with unemployment. And the exploding population means a bigger strain on those services... so all of this can lead the Lebanese communities to feel hostile against Syrians. And (not for all Lebanese people but for many) the relationship with Syria is complex. Syrian forces occupied Lebanon up until 2005. And a lot of people in Lebanon lived through horrible experiences because of that occupation.

### **So why are Lebanese churches serving Syrian refugees?**

Because they see it as the fulfilment of the call to serve their neighbours in need, regardless of who they are. And it's living out the verse in Matthew 5:44 – loving and serving their enemy. Choosing to respond to that call, and serving and sacrificing things to help Syrian refugees is a process of forgiveness for Christians in Lebanon. And there is a mutual understanding growing between the two groups. An understanding that Syrian people are suffering from war, just as some of these Lebanese families suffered. People are coming to see that despite their differences, they still have the same human needs. And whether or not people are Christian, they're still created in God's image – they are His creation.

### **So it's regular people in churches volunteering to do the work?**

Yes. There are families in some churches who have given up their work so they can run refugee programming for very little compensation. I was inspired to see the passion that people are committing to serve

– not just those in need, but people who used to be their enemy. Every day they choose to respond to the need and give their time and energy. And it's not just for a month. Or even six months. It's indefinitely.

### **Finally, what struck you most about the work LSESD is doing?**

The work is community based and relational. And that takes such a huge emotional and physical investment by our partners to assist refugees. The causes of poverty in the region are complex, but the solutions for the experience of poverty can be simple and achievable. And even though we talk about these big numbers, if you just think about a community, and the need there, and the way the generosity of our supporters enables us to respond – it's making a phenomenal difference.

The Middle East Crises Appeal supports important health and educational programs, as well as providing child protection training for all of LSESD's partner churches. But one of the most powerful things it makes possible is reconciliation and friendship.

## Trinity Baptist Church CARE & SHARE



Care & Share at Trinity is a social support/activity program for people 65 years and over who are living in the South/East Metropolitan area. This program is funded by the Commonwealth Home Support Program (CHSP) and is administered by the Trinity Baptist Church.

The aim of the service is to:

- Enhance the general health and wellbeing of the participants
- Be a place to meet and make new friends
- Provide engaging and enjoyable social activities

The program operates on Monday, Wednesday, Thursday & Friday, 9.30am - 2.30pm. A two course hot meal is available each day 12.00pm – 1.00pm.

To be eligible participants need to be 65 years or over and

- Live independently
- Need support to go out of the home
- Potentially socially isolated
- Reasonably mobile
- Independent in their personal hygiene needs

A variety of activities is on offer and includes: board games, indoor bowls, Bocce, iPad, Movies mornings/afternoon, conversation groups, mental stimulation, such as memory games and quizzes, relaxation exercises, cards, bingo, craft and guest speakers.

We welcome you to come along and be our guest. Come for the day, a particular social activity or just for lunch. Please contact the

Program Manager to organise a suitable day.

There is a small fee that regular participants are asked to contribute towards the cost of the activities/program and lunch (\$15.00) but participants will not be disadvantaged from accessing the program if they are experiencing financial difficulties.

Transport may be available to and from the church depending on participants' home address proximity to the Mitcham Council region and surrounding areas.

A referral from myagedcare is required prior to regular attendance. The Program Manager will assist you with this process if required. (1800 200422)

## Flinders Street Baptist Raising funds for Westcare Centre for the homeless

Lloyd Evans's association with WestCare spans 60 years. It includes time on the Baptist Care Board as well as over 15 years of voluntary work in both WestCare's meals and emergency relief services for the homeless.

As a former GP, he's seen human need up close. "I've been in general practice all my life, I've seen alcoholics, people struggling with addictions, with mental health problems, with domestic violence, people lacking support and finance..."

Which is perhaps why he's so committed to community service.

But it was a WestCare client named Nick that inspired Lloyd to branch out into a new area of service – fundraising.

Nick mentioned that he'd love to help raise money for WestCare's kitchen by running a BBQ fundraiser. Lloyd immediately offered to help.

He'd been worshipping at Flinders Street Baptist for 24 years and soon recruited a team of 18 people – including Nick - to run the BBQ at Bunnings' Mile End store.

"Bunnings were very keen to allot a day [to us] quickly because the proceeds were going to such a worthwhile cause," explains Lloyd.

It was a huge effort and raised an impressive \$1600. The following bbq raised a further \$1000. The combined funds were used to buy new furniture for WestCare's dining area, something Lloyd and the team are thrilled about.

"It's important to make WestCare feel as good as your own home, because to some people, it is their home," explains Lloyd.

The BBQs have been running so well that the store has offered more fundraising opportunities than Flinders Street is able to meet. "Unfortunately we just don't have enough numbers to take up all the opportunities," Lloyd explains.

## Sacred Agents

### Just common sense

Jesus sure asked some tough questions. But he also asked some really easy ones, like "Do people pick grapes from thornbushes, or figs from thistles?" Of course not. Even kids know that you get grapes and figs from the IGA.

When occasionally I'm tempted to despair as a sacred agent, I find myself repeating this over and over: "They don't pick grapes from thornbushes. They don't pick grapes from thornbushes." When the media increasingly derides Christianity and lauds secular humanism, what hope do we have of reaching people? Well, plenty. Jesus was pointing out that the difference between good and bad philosophy comes to light through the kind of communities they produce.

Over the last decade, during which Christianity has faced very hostile press, parents have been falling over themselves to enrol their kids in Christian schools in unprecedented numbers. Why? Because when it comes to the crunch, when it really matters - such as your own kids' future - people have a good nose for good fruit.

It happens very locally. Many Australians hate the *idea* of Christian chaplains in public schools, but love the actual chaplain in their own local school. My kids' first school firmly resisted chaplaincy and any whiff of Christian input. The result? Parents were constantly asking us whether their kids could attend our kids club at the church next door to the school. Those parents had a nose for what's stale and what's fresh. It's just common scents.

Which hints to me a tangible way forward for mission in Australian culture. If we don't despair, but live fresh, distinct, communal lives invigorated by God's Spirit, and simply be visible to and smellable by others, the 'aroma of Christ' will do its thing and many prodigals will come to - and follow - their senses.

"Everyone will know you are my disciples if you love one another," said Jesus. Is your church that kind of community? And do you have ways for the neighbourhood to get a whiff of it?

## Hidden Peoples Revealed


*On Tuesday 16<sup>th</sup> August, Global Interaction Cross-cultural Worker Ian Dicks presented a Journey Seminar to SA Baptists on the topic of Hidden Peoples – communities of people from least-reached people groups, now living in Australian cities and towns. The question addressed was, 'what might it take for Hidden Peoples in Adelaide and regional South Australia to be reached with the gospel?'*

Did you know it has been estimated that 80% of non-Christians in the world today, will not be reached with the gospel by any existing missionary efforts? And did you know that some of these very people live within Adelaide and regional South Australia? These people we know as Hidden Peoples.

The biggest barriers between Hidden Peoples and the gospel, are culture and language. What then might it take for us to reach these Hidden Peoples with the Good News of Jesus? The answer is both simple and challenging: To break-down the barriers of culture and language not by expecting Hidden Peoples to adopt ours, but by some of us being willing to adopt theirs! This is precisely what our overseas cross-cultural workers seek to do as they enter communities that are relationship centred and social network orientated.

The goal of a model like this is to see a Community of Faith (church) come to life in another culture and language group. This gives people the opportunity to be transformed to be more like Christ from within their own culture, and it empowers them to share their faith and hope in Jesus in a culturally relevant way throughout their own networks.

A wonderful picture that God provides for us in Scripture, is of a great multitude from every nation, tribe, people and language, giving praise to God (Revelation 7). We understand

# What if I told you that learning to read could lead to raising goats?

Imagine that you have a physical disability and live in a remote village in Nepal. You own very little land, so growing enough food to eat can be difficult... And you have four children to feed.

This is what life is like for Shyamkala Dhobi.

In order to support their young children, Shyamkala and her husband have had to make some really hard choices. To find seasonal work, Shyamkala's husband often had to leave his family and travel to India.

But then Shyamkala learned to read and write – and everything changed!

Like many people in her village, Shyamkala has spent most of her life not knowing how to read or write. So when Baptist World Aid Australia's Christian field partner invited her to join a literacy class, she was very excited to start learning.

It was hard work. But for Shyamkala, it's all been worth it.

"I am able to speak confidently; I am able to read, write and do simple calculation."

After she finished her training, Shyamkala took a loan from the community savings group and bought two goats. Shyamkala has the self-belief and skills she needs to run her

own small business. And it's all because she can read and do basic calculations!

With her determination to create a better life for herself and her family, Shyamkala has since turned her two goats into seven. Better still, Shyamkala's business is doing so well that her husband doesn't need to work in India anymore. Her goats are helping to feed her family!
